We have a lot happening around the school and there is a buzz in the air as we complete Course Confirmation for 2022, support the Year 12's in their short time still with us, and face the External School Review ready to begin planning for 2022.

Every day we are working on small projects to make the school more aesthetically pleasing; a place that puts learning at the fore with wellbeing for all embedded. This is a continual journey for us and one I continue to get excited about.

We have a number of social work placement students with us at the moment and they have hit the ground running. The focus of the external school review is to evaluate our school's performance. The review panel includes a review officer and a trained review principal. Our school review will occur on 7-9th September 2021.


The review panel will identify aspects of our school's improvement that have been verified through the review processes, as well as the improvements that we need to make in the future.

During the external school review, some students, parents, governing council members and staff will be asked to provide information to the review panel in a number of ways. These include: individual interviews, group discussions (with students or staff or parents), meetings (governing council, staff meeting) and visits into classrooms.

We appreciate everyone's support and time in helping us with this external school review process.

QuickSmart

The school offers the Quicksmart Numeracy program to twelve Year 8 students who are working at just below the national benchmark in Maths.

The aim of the program is to develop automaticity in number facts in the four operations of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Problem solving strategies are also taught explicitly to students.

Students, who attended QuickSmart Numeracy last year showed a significant improvement in their PAT-M results which was very pleasing to see.

The program has been running successfully for 3 years at Le Fevre High School. This year the school is participating in trialling QuickSmart as an Online program as part of a research trial in South Australia, with only twenty-one schools participating. Students in one Year 8 Maths class are enjoying practising their recall of number facts in a fun and educational way.

Izac and Hamish say, "QuickSmart helps us with our Maths in the classroom." Patrick can see his improved speed and 100% accuracy results shown as a graph after every OZCAAS session. Tom and Murphy have graduated from multiplication to division this term. Amelia is enjoying learning problem solving strategies every Tuesday in readiness for the PAT-M test later this term. It has been a great effort by all participating students, who attend three sessions per week.

Students were able to continue with the QuickSmart program during the recent lockdown and school holidays by accessing the Online program.

About Bill:



Everything I know about painting is from trial and error, and time in front of the easel."


Billy's paintings tend to be colourful and moderately abstract, which was a style that Le Fevre students related to as they have elements of realism and abstraction. Billy spent 5 weeks working with students to create the work in the exhibition. Some of the works in the exhibition were paintings done over weeks and worked to perfection, others were portraits done in a 100-minute lesson focusing on old portraits from Port Adelaide's historic past.

Metropolitan Youth Health Checks

The Metropolitan Youth Health Service (MY Health) is part of the Women's and Children's Health Network, providing a free and confidential health service to support the health and wellbeing of young people aged between 12 and 25 years.



Well Health Checks is a screening tool offered every 12 months that will enable and encourage early intervention and prevention of chronic disease and other health issues in the community.

MY Health will be providing FREE Well Health Checks for students at Le Fevre, starting on August 18th.

A Well Health Check is conducted by an Aboriginal Clinical Health Worker and a Registered Nurse and is an assessment of a young person's health which involves aspects such as Blood pressure reading, Blood Sugar level testing, vision assessment, hearing assessment and much more.

A letter of consent will be sent home with your child to provide opportunity for an assessment – Please contact our Aboriginal Education team with any questions.



Workabout Centre Visits



Chromebook Program Update

Work is proceeding on the rollout of the Chromebook program this year. The program has unfortunately suffered from severe delays due to impacts of COVID and fleet deliveries meaning that the school ICT department negotiated with multiple education vendors so that the Year 8 program could go ahead. The good news from this work is that the Year 8 component is complete.

As of Week 10 Term 2 the 1 to 1 device program for Year 8s was a success as every student now has a device that they can use and so far minimal issues have been encountered. The use data shows that 68 students are bringing their own purchased device with 46 students loaning a school device.

The Chromebook program will provide the necessary platform to connect students with cloud-based computing including Internet access, Daymap (our Learner Management System), Google G-Suite, and the Department provided Office 365 platform. Coupled to this, the school in partnership with the Governing Council is investing heavily in its backbone ICT infrastructure to ensure a seamless end-user experience when onsite. Outside of the school environment, students will need access to an Internet connection for full Chromebook functioning however offline options are available and students will learn how to operate these aspects of the device.

Lastly we are happy to inform that next component of the Chromebook Program for Year 9 students will commence from Week 6 Term 3 and end by Week 10 Term 3. More information will soon be provided regarding rollout requirements.

Wellbeing

The Wellbeing Team work together with a range of different services and programs to support the Wellbeing of our students.

Programs-

Fork in the Road-

Fork in the Road is an inclusive student lead group supporting the members of the LGBTIQA+ community and their friends to ensure that Le Fevre High School is a safe environment for all genders, identities, and pronouns.

Port Adelaide Football Club-

Year 10 students are participating in the *Power to End Violence Against Women & Empowered* programs which are primary prevention programs developed to raise awareness around the issue of violence against women and promote respectful relationships to young men and women across schools in South Australia. Port Adelaide Football Club has worked together with Centacare Catholic Family Services, the Department for Education, and The City of Port Adelaide Enfield to develop this program.

Hoops 4 Life-

Hoops 4 Life is an integrated community focused basketball program that is specifically designed to utilise the sport to engage students within the school community. The program uses the sport of basketball as the engagement tool and education platform. The program assists students in developing positive social, behavioural, and emotional skills.

Chill Out -

Chill Out is a lunchtime program that runs on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday from the Home Ec Centre. Students are provided with things such as toasties and fruit. The program is supported by Kick Start, Local Churches, and the Drakes Community Dollars Program.

Services-

Grow Wellbeing-

Grow Wellbeing provides ongoing wellbeing support with a qualified mental health clinician. To access this support, students will need to access a mental health care plan from their general practitioner (GP). This will allow for 10 free sessions with the program annually. This service can help students to speak about issues that are impacting them including, but not limited to, friendships/family, grief and loss, self-esteem, self-harm, stress & worry, anxiety/depression, and anger management.

Stan Giamalis-

Stan works is a qualified social worker that supports the well-being of students. Stan has worked supporting young people in the Western Suburbs both on school sites and at the local Headspace. Students will need to access a mental health care plan from their general practitioner (GP) to access 10 free sessions.

Reconnect-

City of Port Adelaide Enfield's Reconnect Program supports young people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness through family breakdown and can support with mediation between families.

Uniting Communities-

Therapeutics Youth Services and Streetlink Drug and Alcohol Services offer support onsite to students who have been referred.

Other services that work alongside Le Fevre High School are Uniting SA, The Smith Family and Relationships Australia.

KAURNA LANGUAGE WORKSHOP











Year 8 "Hanging Our With Friends" and Year Indonesian Taste Test

Australian Business Career Network—Leadership Skills for Young Women Program

During weeks 2 and 3 of Term 3, 15 female senior students participated in the Australian Business Career Network's FOCUS: Leadership Skills for Young Women Program. The program aims to provide young women with the essential leadership skills they need to engage in a successful, meaningful career and particularly addresses the underrepresentation of women in senior roles in Australia. It is designed to support young women to develop their leadership skills, aspire to senior roles in business and the community, and foster a sense of self-belief that will encourage them to aim high.

Over the course of the two sessions students worked in small groups with female executives who acted as role models and mentors, sharing their own career journeys and challenges as well as an introduction to leadership styles, realising strengths and creating a leadership picture. The response from the students was overwhelmingly positive with students reporting they feel they gained a lot from the program.

What was the most useful thing you learnt in the program?

- Getting to know the mentors was really eye opening, I further learnt the importance of believing in yourself, being persistent, not giving up
- Time management is the key to success, and it is important to forgive yourself if you make any mistakes
- That it's ok to fail, and that life will never be perfect but there are lots of little things we can do to make it better Failure leading to success

How will you apply it in your daily life?

- I will remember the importance and messages shared during the meeting and take it through my life, my journeys and failures.
- Not taking it so hardly when I do fail
- When I fail, to not feel so low on myself and understand it's a learning experience
 I will apply it in my own life as a way of if I fail I can use it and turn it into something good instead of just giving up

What was the most important thing you learnt from your mentor?

- Good sleep is the key to be productive during the day. And don't see failure as a big deal because failure is a part of success.
- I'm not alone in the struggles I'm going through. I don't have to know everything right now.
- Ways to stay motivated and get work done
- How they bounced back from their failures....learning that these successful women, have had failures throughout their life I learnt that our weaknesses aren't bad things, and that they're rooms for improvement so that we can better ourselves



A new application for the School Card Grant must be completed and lodged each year. Please bring your Concession Card with you when making the application. School Card Application Forms are available at www.sa.gov.au under the heading Education and Learning, Financial Support, School Card Scheme, Applications. Applications can be made online and the information is sent to the government school where the children attend. Children attending different government schools can be all listed on the one online application.
