This term there has been a huge focus on The Resilience Project. We have put a blanket ban on anything else occurring on a Tuesday afternoon so students and teachers can embark on a journey of Gratitude, Empathy, Mindfulness and Emotional Literacy. ARTS NEWS




Le Fevre Arts have had a busy term and won some outstanding awards worth celebrating in term 3.

Science

The Inclusive Education class has again been working with Mr Au on some science projects. This term the students have been learning about matter, density, volume and mass. They have been looking at the different densities of liquids, and how the concentration of solutions can have the same mass and volume, but different density. They have also learnt how to calculate the density of a liquid using the volume and mass. One of the experiments the students participated in was using different fruit juices. The juices with the highest density sat on the bottom, while the juices with a lower density sat on the top. This was a fun and engaging experiment and the students loved it because they got to drink the juice after.















Swimming

The Inclusive Education class has continued with their swimming lessons again this term. Through the swimming program, students have been learning about different aspects of water safety, in and out of the water. They have also been learning about different styles of swimming and how to tread water. The swimming program has allowed them to develop their social skills, and build their confidence and their self-esteem. It has been wonderful to see their confidence in and around the water grow. Not only did they have heaps of fun, but they also got a great workout.


NUMERACY @ LE FEVRE HIGH SCHOOL

Last term the students participated in MathsCraft. What is MathsCraft you might ask? MathsCraft is a student driven workshop where students from all different schools get together and solve math problems. But these aren't just any problems, they are problems where students can take many different journeys to the finish line, indeed they may all have different finish lines!

The day was held at Le Fevre High School as we are the only current provider of MathsCraft in the western area. Schools that attended were North Haven Primary School, West Lakes Shore Schools, Westport Primary School, Grange Primary School, Ocean View College and of course Le Fevre High School.

The students found the day, "A blast". They learned to develop flexible learning skills and discovered new strategies to solve problems. The last half an hour saw parents of the students attending observe the final 30 minutes and become a part of the wonder of MathsCraft.

The day began with a warmup activity, 'The climbing game'. This consisted of a game board like the one pictured to the right. Students took turns to move a counter that can only be moved to an adjacent dot higher than its current position. By playing this game, students developed strategies that supported algorithmic thinking.



The next math problem the students tackled is called 'The farmers sheep'. The students had to place 25 sheep so that if the farmer looked out of any window, they would only have nine sheep as shown in the diagram to the left. This is a great problem for students to notice patterns then extend their thinking to seeing a different number of sheep or trying to place more/less than 25 sheep.

We ended with a whiteboard full of varying solutions and lots of discussion about how to place the sheep around the house.

The last problem was the 'Number Of Digits And The Digit Sum'. The framework for this question can be seen below. The number in question contains 3 digits (ND) and the sum of the digits (DS) is 6.

231

ND = 3

DS = 6

The students were then challenged to find as many integers as possible that fit these rules. When they thought they found all the numbers, they were challenged about their belief around the idea, "Are you sure?".

This models students' generalisations, they soon see that they need a strategy to record their numbers, then they can see a pattern. Then the fun begins, we started to change it up, what does it look like if DS is now 7 or 8 or 9 and so on. The students found an elegant pattern that was sitting behind these questions and there was a lot of 'aha' moments.

The students really did have a great time and it was a joy running the day for them. I would like to thank the staff and students for attending the day and I can't wait for the next one!

YEAR 7 HEALTH AND P.E.

This semester Mrs Penekelis' Year 7 Health and P.E class have been introduced to a taste test of a range of Invasion Games. Invasion games are games in which the aim is to invade an opponent's territory and score a goal or point. These are typically fast-paced games that need teamwork in order to control the ball, keep possession, move into a scoring position, and prevent the opposition from scoring. Teams share the same playing area as they attempt to both score and prevent the other team from scoring. Some of the sports that have been focused on in this unit include soccer, basketball, hockey and netball to name a few.

The class has been lucky enough to receive 2 netball coaching sessions from members of Netball SA. Throughout these sessions students have been exposed to drills that promote foot work, team work and ball movement.

YEAR 10 OUTDOOR EDUCATION

Late last term the Year 10 Outdoor Education students partnered up with Semaphore Life Saving Club to complete their HLTAID012 First Aid Qualification.

Students participated in a face-to-face delivery and online e-learning theory assessment.

Students engaged in a scenario assessment where they were required to demonstrate the essential skills and knowledge to respond to a range of first aid or emergency situations, including scenarios. Students demonstrated providing cardiopulmonary resuscitation procedures- CPR on adult, child and infant training manikins, and use of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) on child in line with the Australian Resuscitation Council (ARC) Guidelines.


YEAR 11 NEWS














BULLYING, NO WAY DAY

CROSS CURRICULUM STUDIES

Cross Curricular Studies at LeFevre High school comprise Stage 1 Personal Learning Plan, Stage 2 Research Project, Stage 1 Workplace Practices and Stage 2 Workplace Practices. These subjects introduce students to the SACE, teach them valuable research skills and develop work readiness at the senior level. Cross curricular studies are a compulsory part of the SACE certificate.

Cross Curriculum staffing update September 2023:

Research Project teachers include, Ms. Andee Kalatzis, Ms. Pru Pole, Mr. James Dekort and Mr. Nick Brown. The Year 10 Personal Learning Plan teachers are Ms. Elle Penekelis, Mr. Ben Abbott, Mr. Robert Button and Ms. Pru Pole. Workplace Practices is currently being taught by Ms. Andee Kalatzis and Mr. Ben Jones.

Stage 2 Research Project Key Dates:

- Research Project Folio (30% no word limit) due week 10, 2023.
- Research Outcome (40%, 2,000 words) draft due week 6, term 4, 2023. Final copy due week 4, term 1, 2024.
- Research Evaluation (30%, 1500 words) Draft due week 4, term 2, 2024. Final copy due week 6, term 2, 2024.

The year 11 cohort commenced the Research Project in Semester 2, 2023 and will finish the course in Semester 1, 2024. The Research Project comprises 3 assessment tasks, the first of which is a 10-page folio showcasing the research processes and sources relevant to the research question. A draft of the folio is due at the end of term 3, with the final copy of the research folio due early in term 4. The research outcome and evaluation will be completed in terms 1 and 2 of 2023. All students who successfully complete the subject with a C- grade or better will be awarded 10 Stage 2 SACE credits.

The students started the semester by brainstorming topic ideas for their project. Preliminary research, peer interaction and teacher input supported learners to refine their topic of interest to a specific question. Proposed areas of student inquiry include, "how do genetics affect the development of lung cancer?" "How do parenting styles affect childhood development?" "How have international leagues and players impacted the development of basketball globally?" and "How does vaping affect the wellbeing of young people?" Such exemplars are a pleasing indicator of research project diversity in our school.

So far this term, students have brainstormed ideas on a lotus chart, developed a question, completed a mind map and written a research proposal. They are currently conducting interviews and surveys to gather expert, and community data relevant to their research project question. The data will be collated, analysed, and suitably presented in the folio. Moving forward, learners will locate and examine secondary sources which will be annotated and included in the folio.

We are so lucky to have expert, experienced teachers and a Languages Policy that acknowledges the importance of language learning by ensuring that Indonesian is a core compulsory subject in Years 7 to 9. 


